And the one who was seated on the throne said, "See, I am making all things new." (Rev. 21:5)

Over the last couple of months I have been attempting to "set the stage" so to speak for how we might understand the calling that God has given us individually and corporately in our life and ministry as Christians whom God has gathered as First Presbyterian Church. We have considered God's design for creation as revealed to us in the beginning of Genesis (Shalom). the brokenness and entanglement of creation through Sin's deep penetration of all God's good creation, and the future picture God reveals to us of all creation one day being fully restored by God. As the verse from Revelation above reminds us. God is in that process of making all things new. One of the ways Scripture speaks to this process is the ministry of reconciliation, and it will be upon this ministry that we will focus our teaching over the summer months. Before reading on I encourage you to stop, open your Bible, and read 2 Corinthians 5:11 – 6:1.

Paul shares with the Christians in Corinth (and in Ashland, OH) some of his key understandings about the ministry of reconciliation; I would like to focus on three words that I pray will stay on the forefront of our minds and hearts in the weeks to come as we consider how we can participate in the ministry of reconciliation right here in Ashland.

# A Ministry of Reconciliation

#### continued from p.1

Foundation - "For our sake he made him to be sin who knew no sin, so that in him we might become the righteousness of God." (5:21) Jesus Christ is the foundation of our ministry of reconciliation. He is the cornerstone upon which the entire Kingdom of God is built. Our participation in reconciliation work can and should only flow through our own personal faith and trust in Jesus Christ as Savior and Lord of all. This is what is unique to us as the church – we offer Jesus Christ to the world as the source of reconciliation, and we can only offer Christ to the world when we ourselves are reconciled to God through Christ.

**Calling** – "All this is from God, who reconciled us to himself through Christ, and has given us the ministry of reconciliation; that is, in Christ God was reconciling the world to himself, not counting their trespasses against them, and entrusting the message of reconciliation to us." (5:18-19) These verses are so powerful I'm hardly compelled to add anything to them! Please take note of two things: the medium and the scope. God chooses to use us - entrusts this ministry to us! God is reconciling the world to himself – not just you and me, but the world! God is in the process of restoring all things in the world to the way God intends them to be, and chooses us to participate in this incredible work. What an honor!

Motivation — "As we work together with him, we urge you also not to accept the grace of God in vain." What a great reminder; I need to hear this verse daily. It is so easy to come into a relationship with God through Christ and become content with enjoying God's love, joy, peace, and the many more incredible blessings that receive through being in relationship with God. And yet Paul reminds us; don't receive God's grace in vain. In other words, we are blessed to be a blessing. As we receive the tremendous blessings of walking in relationship with God, the blessings motivate us to share them with others participating with God and one another to carry God's love, in Christ, to the world.

In the weeks to come we will consider specific ways of participating in God's ministry of reconciliation of the world. We will consider how this ministry may enlighten our understanding of work, justice, ethics, and beauty, just to name a few potential topics. And as we journey together, may we live into and out of this incredible truth: "So if anyone is in Christ, there is a new creation: everything old has passed away; see everything has become new!" (5:17)

# Passport to **Entertainment and Enrichment**

Following are brief descriptions of the books CSLA has given our library this year. They are ready for circulation.

With All Our Prayers: Walking with God Through the Christian Year by John B. Rogers, Jr. A retired Presbyterian pastor, John B. Rogers has collected many of his pastoral prayers in this volume. They are very meaningful and serve as good models. Anyone having difficulty with prayer or needing inspiration would find them helpful.

The Way of Grace: Finding God on the Path of Surrender by Glandion Carney with Marjean Brooks.

Glandion Carney, author of *The Way of Grace*, is a pastor and church leader whose vigorous life was changed forever when he was diagnosed with Parkinson's Disease. In this small book he describes how God's grace has led and continues to lead him in coping with his illness.

Anna's Crossing by Suzanne Woods Fisher. An interesting addition to novels about the Amish is Suzanne Woods Fisher's Anna's Crossing. It is the fictionalized account of the journey of the first Amish and Mennonites to arrive in America from Europe in the eighteenth century.

Traveler's Rest by Ann Tatlock.

Jane Morrow, the protagonist in Ann Tatlock's novel, *Traveler's Rest*, is spending the summer in Ashville, North Carolina. That affords her the opportunity to visit her fiancé who was severely injured in Iraq and is a patient in the VA hospital. While there, she meets and becomes friends with two other men whose lives have been scarred in other ways. The need for patience, forgiveness, healing, and greater trust in God are themes treated in the novel.

The Boy Who Loved Rain by Gerard Kelly. Gerard Kelly's first novel, The Boy Who Loved Rain, is about a dysfunctional British family whose problems are psychological. The fourteen-year-old son has a recurring nightmare. As his mental and emotional state worsens, his parents disagree about treatment for him. It takes them a



long time before they realize and accept that their behavior is responsible for his problems.

Mercy's Rain by Cindy K. Sproles
The action of Mercy's Rain takes place in the
Tennessee mountains at the end of the nineteenth
century. Cindy K. Sproles' powerful novel shows
that abuse—sexual, psychological, and
emotional—is not just a contemporary problem.
She has created strong, credible characters who
have to confront unbelievable situations.

The Crimson Cord by Jill Eileen Smith. Jill Eileen Smith fictionalizes the biblical story of Rahab, the prostitute who housed two Israelites sent to spy on Jericho and to report to Joshua. Not only did Rahab give lodging to men but also instructed them how to leave the city undetected. The bargain included the promise that she, her family, and anyone in her home would be saved when Jericho was destroyed. The novel begins the author's new series, Daughters of the Promised Land.




