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Passport to **Entertainment and Enrichment**

Our collection of novels has been increased by CSLA this year. The following have be accessioned and will soon be on the shelves, if they are not already.

1. *The Trouble with Patience* by Maggie Brendan.

History, romance, and mystery are all included in Maggie Brendan's *The Trouble with Patience*. A rough gold-rush town in the Montana Territory is the site of the action in the 1860s. Patience Cavanaugh's grandmother bequeaths her boarding house to her granddaughter and the problems begin immediately.

- 2. The Innocent by Ann H. Gabhart. Another novel set in the 1860s is The Innocent by Ann H. Gabhart. Part of Karlyn Kearney's problem is she doesn't know whether she is a widow or not. The other part is that she is being evicted from her home. Two years before the end of the Civil War, she is notified that her husband is missing. Their house is not paid for and she has no money to continue making payments. Karlyn goes to live in the nearby Shaker community and strange things begin to happen there.
- 3. When Hope Blossoms by Kim Vogel Sawyer.

The protagonists in *When Hope Blossoms* by Kim Vogel Sawyer are both still grieving the deaths of their spouses. Amy Knackstedt is an Old-Order Mennonite and she moves to a property next to that owned by a man who left that faith years before. The problems begin because her children and her neighbor Tim become very fond of each other.

4. A Place in His Heart by Rebecca DeMarino. The historical novel, A Place in His Heart by Rebecca DeMarino is a fictionalized account of Mary and Barnabas Horton, her ninth great -grandparents. It tells how they met and

married in the seventeenth century. They moved from England to the New World and established a community on what today is Long Island.

5. *In Firefly Valley: a Novel* by Amanda Cabot.

Amanda Cabot has written the sequel to *At Bluebonnet Lake* in *In Firefly Valley*. The action again takes place at Rainbow's End resort. Marisa St. George returns to her hometown to become the resort's business manager when her job at an Atlanta firm is eliminated. Although she likes her new job more than she expected to, many problems occur.

6. Through Waters Deep: a Novel by Sarah Sundin.

The eight months prior to the attack on Pearl Harbor is the time frame for *Through Waters Deep* by Sarah Sundin. The action occurs in the Boston Navy Yard and the North Atlantic. Feelings are escalating with regard to whether the United States should enter the war or not and acts of sabotage begin in the Navy Yard. Mary Stirling and Jim Avery, former high school classmates, become reacquainted in Boston and become involved in solving the mystery of the sabotage.

- Have you ever been around a campfire and noticed a piece of coal that falls away from the flames for a bit? It doesn't take long for it to lose its glow and ability to retain radiate heat and light. I find that many folks begin to feel this way towards the end of the summer as travel and change in lifestyle draws them away from the church community. Here's the good news: when placed back within the fire the coal very quickly begins to glow once more! I pray that if this speaks to you that you will use the transition back into the "school year schedule" to reconnect with your church family and rejoin the fire.

Property Ministry

I would like to thank all the members and staff that participated in our successful Clean-up the Church Week. Members, staff, and friends donated many hours to make our building cleaner and a little less cluttered.

I would like to give a special than you to Linda Swanson who became the on-site coordinator by default and the Bartters for removing the leftover items from the church. The general clean up, clear out, and organize was a great success. Thank you.

Remember that the church always has projects for those who have a desire to share their talents. Just ask what you can do.

Two projects will be happening in the near future. The lower stained glass window vents in the sanctuary will be refurbished and the needed repairs to the windows themselves will be done. The funds will come from Memorial Funds for that purpose. The slate on the main roof will be attended to in the fall. They are going to replace and repair many different concerns as needed and the budget permits.

Property Ministry is in negotiations with the company to revisit the tuck-pointing on the Third Street side, but costs and a timetable is not yet established.

The 200th Anniversary projects that have been completed have been paid or have the funds in hand to pay for them. The next phase is in the planning stages and depends on fund availability to complete.

All in all, for the age of our facilities most of what we are addressing is just normal maintenance.

Future cast is the middle school property disposal and transition and what it means for our church. Parking, green space, and future church expansion are possibilities. Please keep the leadership in your prayers and share your input on these matters.

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Prayer Ministry

While I was with my son Doug's family in North Carolina, my granddaughter's fish died. It was very traumatic to her because she had had this fish nearly half of her life! In addition, her brother's fish was and is still living. She wailed and cried and cried some more held lovingly in her mother's arms and no words were able to give her comfort. I observed and learned much. My son offered to have a funeral service for her fish and when she was ready, we were in her clothing chest looking for

an appropriate "blanket" to wrap her pet, one that would help her know she was still close by. We went outside, committed the pet fish to the ground and said the Lord's Prayer. It brought comfort to us all until the next morning. I was sitting in church and began to weep. I wrote a note to both my son and his wife explaining and I wanted nothing more than to hold their hands. After the service, we went to the Prayer Room to ask prayers. I was unable to speak and so my son told my story. Imagine being so upset over a pet. Well, it was more than that. I had learned also that Bozena had died that morning. You know, losses add up. One brings on memories of another. Grief can be magnified when we least expect it to happen. That might include a miscarriage, loss of a job, loss of a dream, loss of good health and more.

I share all of this because we have lost a dear one from our congregation and one for whom we have been praying for months. Grief can sneak up on us and it cannot be satisfied with distractions or with platitudes such as, "It's going to be all right" or " is now with God in Heaven." What is needed is the love of God through the touch of a person. I firmly believe that one reason Jesus taught us to name the Lord, Father, is this: we often feel as vulnerable as children. We actually need to climb up on a lap and weep on a strong

shoulder. We cannot always find that. Sometimes we are supposed to BE that shoulder ourselves. What is needed is a hug, or the touch of a hand, or a recognition, "You are hurting, aren't you?" or "How are you doing today?" It is in being with the person in their grief that can Jesus be the healer when we invite Him in, too. We are called to comfort one another as He comforts us.


