New handicap parking places have been established in front of the office door on Church street. Please be aware and respect them for they are official.

Scott and Larue roofing have completed the slate roofing repair of the church. This completes the last major maintenance project this year. Next year the third street side masonry will be repaired.

There are some still some minor painting and touch up jobs around the church to complete as well as sealing the basement, but overall all is good for our building.

The last phase of the Capital Funds project has hit a snag. The company we were dealing with has reorganized and the new estimates for the sound system are not reasonable. We will be exploring other options to upgrade the audio going forward.

There have been meetings and discussions with the school system and others about what will



happen with the Middle School property. Be assured that our church leadership is closely considering all options and making preparations to that end. The best estimate at this time is demolition and property disposal will happen a few months into next year. There will be a public auction after demolition is completed.

The property ministry appreciates all the help we receive to maintain this building. Your observations and input are always welcome.

And let us consider how to stir up one another to love and good works, not neglecting to meet together, as is the habit of some, but encouraging one another, and all the more as you see the Day drawing near. Hebrews 10:24-25

The world can be a busy place -- so busy we sometimes need to set *time* priorities.

Certainly, that was the situation for the officials who were running the NCAA Softball Regionals. The third scheduled game of the day was between Louisiana Lafayette and Baylor. Looking for ways to keep things on time, it was decided they would forego the playing of the National Anthem.

The officials felt perfectly comfortable with their judgment. After all, hadn't the Anthem been sung at the beginning of the day's activities? Just as importantly, no official could find anything in any rulebook that demanded the singing of the nation's song before every one of the afternoon's softball battles.

The announcement was made to the crowd over the PA: "Because of time issues there will be no National Anthem before the game." The news was not met with pleasure by the fans. Indeed, it didn't take too long for representatives from the stands to voice an official protest.

They were told, "No, our decision stands. No Anthem will be sung."

As I said, the world is a busy place, and sometimes we have to make decisions as to how we are going to use our time. That's the way it was that day for the fans who had come to watch the game at Lansom Park. They made their decision. Without any music, without the use of the public address system, without a great deal of organization, the people sang the nation's Anthem. The players stopped and took off their caps; the umpires stopped and stood respectfully, while the people sang.

Many who were there that day were moved to tears, and no objections have been made about a misuse of time. Indeed, most agree it had been the right thing to do.



Now the only reason I bring this little story to your attention is that you and I make similar decisions about *our* use of time. For example, this is Thursday, and in a few days it will be Sunday. You will wake up and be confronted with numerous ways you could spend those hours.

Maybe the golf course beckons ... or you need to do some lawn work ... or the fish have been biting ... or a birthday needs celebrating ... or maybe you have to visit a sick relative. I don't know what is on your list of things to do, but I certainly hope attending worship is on that list.

Yes, I realize those other things need to be done, but worshipping the Lord whose Son died so we might be forgiven and granted a place in heaven is not a matter inconsequential. Now you can

skip church, just like those fans could have skipped the singing of the Anthem. You *can skip* such things, and it won't be the end of the world.

But it is good to do some things-- even if they cost time -- because it is the right thing to do.

#### THE PRAYER:

Dear Lord, each of us has 24 hours in a day. Grant us the wisdom to use those hours wisely, so You may be glorified, and we may do that which is right. In Jesus' Name. Amen.

#### **CHILDREN'S MINISTRY**

What's happening with our kids ...

Have you noticed tattoos on the forearms of our kids?

What a great way for them to learn a different Scripture verse each week, and have an opportunity share their faith with friends. Please ask them to show you.

Children's ministry is currently in two forms, Atrium time on the third floor during Sunday morning worship, and fellowship time in the "beach room" during Wednesday evening Oasis. On Sunday, the focus is to experience and share love through a variety of activities. Placed around the Atrium are centers where children can choose to participate in various "works." Each child is encouraged to do two meditative works and one craft work each week. Setting up the prayer table is a favorite for meditation, with other options being handling prayer rocks and concentrating on the Lord's Prayer on the ceiling while relaxing in a bean bag. In all of these activities, the emphasis is on being present in the moment.

To learn and practice hospitality and selfforgetfulness, the children have recently shared a time of conversation and fellowship with four adults in the lounge during worship. They are excited about repeating this "Celebration of You," inviting another group of adults. To discern which adult friends to invite involved prayer and becoming familiar with the church directory.

Director of Children's Ministry, Tia Sponsler, has the dedicated assistance of husband Aaron, but welcomes other adults to visit at either of these times. Herman Helser has provided much of the material and supplies for several of the works in the Atrium. Your prayers for this ministry are coveted, as the Spirit works in these young lives, especially as they prepare to lead worship in the sanctuary on November 29.

#### **CROP HUNGER WALK**

#### **MISSION MINISTRY TEAM Ashland County Association** for Bible Instruction in Schools

With support from this congregation, Bible instruction is reaching over 85 school students in the Mapleton School District on a weekly basis from October through mid-May. The Ashland County Association for Bible Instruction in Schools was initiated in 1946, bringing Bible teaching to hundreds of students over the decades. Currently, 2 instructors work with first through eighth graders for a 15 minute lesson during lunch period, always with parental permission. Lessons are based on a

four year rotation, with students learning about Exodus this year.
