Did Christ die for nothing?

My immediate response to this question is, "Of course not! Don't be ridiculous. It's Christ's death that brought forgiveness of sin, provided the path for salvation, and humiliated the evil principalities of the world. It's in Christ's death that He met (and continues to meet!) the world in its suffering, paid the consequence of sin, and began the process of restoring creation with the Creator. Of course Christ did not die for nothing!" Yet upon that response a follow-up question comes to mind: Do I still live as though Christ died for nothing?

This morning as I began my day I was led to Galatians 2:21 in which Paul states, "I do not nullify the grace of God; for if justification comes through the law, then Christ died for nothing." As I read and began to reflect upon this verse, I summarized it in this way: If I believe that anything I do adds or takes away from the justification I have in Jesus Christ's work on the cross, then Christ died for nothing. If I believe that any aspect of what I do adds to my salvation, helps earn God's approval, or makes God love me more or less, then Christ died for nothing. If I look back on my day and feel like I lived obediently and therefore I'm in good standing with God, then Christ died for nothing. If I believe that any aspect of God's love towards me depends upon what I do or do not do, then Christ died for nothing.

live our lives of faith disconnected from our studies and our 40 hour work weeks. At the conference students can interact with people and speakers that demonstrate through their lives, stories and illustrations how they are seeing Christ restore and redeem their work, field of study, and industry. We had the great privilege to take 10 students and Brock Kertoy, who works in the Graduate Admissions Department and is an AU Assistant Women's Soccer Coach.

Here is a taste of some things that I learned and am processing now that I am back. Author and principle of The Washington Institute, Steve Garber challenged us with the Hebrew word "YADA." He shared that if we are to have a true Hebrew and Christian view of the world we must "KNOW" the world or "YADA" the world. To truly know means to "have knowledge of, which means

we have responsibility to and if responsibility to then to care for." He proposed that the hardest question in the world is "Can you really know the world and love the world?" As a husband, father, campus minister, outdoor leader I am challenged with this. Now that I know the difficulties, challenges and realities of these areas and the responsibilities they bring, am I willing to pay the cost to truly CARE for them? If I and we engage in this fully then we are truly "knowing" them. If so, we are "YADA" (knowing) life with an accurate biblical worldview. So, with so much to CARE for in our world, ask the Lord "What is mine to CARE for?"

One area that I believe that Lord has called me to YADA, to care for, is seeing more minorities and those of other races experience the world of Recreation and Adventure. I picked up a book at Jubilee by the keynote speaker of the WEA (Wilderness Education Association) conference that I will be taking 5 students to February 25-27. It is titled "The Adventure Gap." We will hear this week about the first African-American team to summit Denali in Alaska. He speaks about how there is a gap in our world with minorities not taking to the mountains for recreation and continued on p. 3




equip women with the knowledge and tools to provide for themselves and their families.

Year of the Snake 1989

by Sue Lile Inman

Although 1989 was China's Year of the Snake, the novel does not deal with China. Did Christ die for nothing?

"And when you were dead in your trespasses and the uncircumcision of your flesh, God made you alive together with him, when he forgave us all our trespasses, erasing the record that stood against us with its legal demands. He set this aside, nailing it to the cross." (Col. 2:13-15)

This is the nature of grace. We have done nothing, nor can we do anything to earn God's favor. Our salvation (justification) rests solely in the work of Jesus Christ. It is only through faith in this reality that we can be "saved." "For by grace you have been saved through faith, and this is not your own doing; it is the gift of God." (Eph. 2:8) This is very foreign to us; we are used to having to earn most things in life that we receive. Even the love that we receive from others is often earned. Because God's saving grace is so radical, we can quickly move back into an attitude of having to earn God's love and forgiveness. It's hard for us to convince ourselves that we are simply to have faith in Christ and receive the blessings. It seems too simple, yet any other attitude towards God's grace is to make the claim that Christ died for nothing. It seems too simple, yet any other attitude towards God's grace puts my faith in me and in my works, meaning that Christ died for nothing. It seems too simple, yet any other attitude towards God's grace is to put my trust in religion instead of the relationship with God offered to me in Jesus Christ, meaning that Christ died for nothing.

And yet when we begin to grasp and receive this radical, unconditional, grace-filled love of God in Jesus Christ it becomes the source of a radical transformation that God begins within us. It brings incredible freedom. It meets our deepest desires. It gives us the courage to let go of "the sin that clings so closely" so that we can "run with perseverance the race that is set before us."
