Giving Birth...

As many of you know I am currently enrolled in a certificate program and am being trained as a spiritual director. That is only relevant to this article because this morning I was reading one of required texts, Holy Listening, and this particular chapter was speaking to how the role of the spiritual director is similar to the role of the midwife. The spiritual director, like a midwife, fulfills a role of presence and encouragement, sometimes coaching and other times silent, always helping the one giving labor to understand where they are in the process of giving birth as they remain empathic to the overwhelming feelings they are experiencing. The analogy can further play out, but I couldn't help but smile because this is the fourth time in the past week that this theme has come up – once in our

corporate staff meeting, once on our staff and leader retreat, once in a conversation with an individual staff member, and now in my reading early this morning.

This has inspired me in two ways; the first is to put together an advent series highlighting some of the birth stories in the Bible. More to come on that in a just a few short months! The second way this has inspired me is to begin to ponder a series of metaphorical questions that are forming in my mind. I invite you to ponder them with me, and to do so by asking and answering these questions in regards to your own spiritual life. I then invite you to answer them again in regards to the life and ministry of FPC Ashland. Should you respond to this invitation I would love to spend some time hearing from you and praying with

Passport to Entertainment and Enrichment

Some of the novels with which CSLA has provided our library since the last issue of *The Herald* are the following:

1. *Lock, Stock, and Over a Barrel* by Melody Carlson.

The death of her elderly aunt affords Daphne Ballinger with the excuse she wants to leave her job in New York City after twelve years. She returns to the Midwest and is stunned to learn that she is the sole beneficiary of her aunt's estate. The will has some interesting strings attached. One is that she must marry within a year.

2. *Dating, Dining, and Desperation* by Melody Carlson.

Daphne Ballinger's search for a husband continues in the sequel to the novel described above. Her friends try to "help" her in the search, annoying her. She wishes they would forget about matchmaking. Daphne befriends a little girl who is living with her grandmother nearby. When the grandmother dies, her son, a marine and the girl's uncle, come home on leave. Daphne meets him and wonders whether he might be "Mr. Right."

3. Land of Silence by Tess Afshar.

Three of the four Gospels tell of the woman cured of a longstanding bleeding disorder by touching Jesus' garment. According to Jewish law, she had been considered unclean for a dozen years. So little information affords Tess Afshar much latitude in creating the woman's story. Beginning with the death of her young brother, other tragedies occur until her life becomes almost intolerable. Although she is skeptical of Jesus' increasing acclaim, having spent most of her money on doctors and treatments, she gives in and joins the crowd following the Master one day and we know the outcome.

4. *To Follow Her Heart* by Rebecca DeMarino.

concludes with *To Follow Her Heart*. Most of the author's characters are based on real people but Patience Terry, this novel's protagonist, is not. Patience is aptly named because it takes almost two years for Jeremy Horton to agree to marry her although the couple had assumed that they would wed. However, when they would talk about it, something would occur that Jeremy felt he should attend to. Tragedy strikes the Horton property in England and he leaves Patience again. She breaks off teir relationship. Will she change her mind?

5. *A Daughter's Dream* by Shelley Shepard Gray.

Two themes support the action of *A Daughter's Dream*, another novel about Amish family life. One theme is finding one's special place in life and the second is the good that can result from tragedy. The Kisinger siblings have had to make many adjustments due to the death of their father. One of the girls, Rebecca, has dreamed of being a teacher and she begins to help at the Amish school. Soon, she realizes that isn't for her and she resumes her successful job at the family's lumber business in Charm, Ohio.

The tragic death of his brother and sister-inlaw has caused changes in Jacob Yoder's life, too. He returns to Charm to help his parents farm and to care for his orphaned niece. He finds out that farming is not his specialty. Carpentry is and he secures a job at the lumber yard. Their situations and new hopes for the future form an attraction between Rebecca and Jacob.

you as God uses this exercise to draw you into a deeper experience of intimacy and expectation.

- Do I believe that God is birthing something new in me?
- What are the signs that I might be (or am not) "expecting"?
- As I nurture that which the Spirit is birthing in me, how might this form my prayers?
- What dreams and desires are forming in me for this "child"?
- What might the labor process look like?
- How will I deal with the pain, fear, doubts and confusion that I might feel?
- With whom will I share my joy, excitement, and anxiety?
- Has God given me a picture or vision of that which God is birthing in me?
- How am I called to be a faithful steward of this gift?
- Am I willing to trust God with the process, resting in the promise and presence of Christ?
- Am I willing to allow for the necessary changes to take place in myself in order to allow God to birth something new in me?

I look forward to a time when God nudges me to begin to share my answers to these questions on behalf of FPC Ashland. For now, I invite you into this exercise. And I would love to hear your responses, both for your own life and for the life of our congregation. I will say this – I am confident that God is birthing a new thing in and through this congregation. I pray that we will carry a spirit of expectation, openness, and obedience as we faithfully wait the revealing of all God plans to bring to life in us in the months to come.
