I speak a variation of one or more of these particular phrases on an almost daily basis: "I need you to be patient;" "Yes, but I would like vou to wait a little bit;" "I will let you know when it is time;" "A few more minutes...please...just give me a few more minutes." I often speak them to a child who has one thing in mind: a snack, a show, a game, a bath, a trip, etc., etc., etc. My adult brain has a very specific image in mind when I request that a child wait with patience. It is a picture that envisions a child sitting quietly in a chair, or patiently finding something else to do until I finish whatever task might be preoccupying my mind and time. To a child, however,

patiently waiting is active waiting. It is filled with eager anticipation that at any moment they are going to receive their hearts' desire. It includes several reminders that they are still waiting, just in case one might have forgotten. Waiting with patience often holds a different meaning to an adult that it does a child.

Advent is the season of waiting. As Israel waited for the first coming of the Messiah, we now wait for the second coming of the Messiah. Even as I was writing this last sentence, I confess that it lacks the emotion and excitement that it warrants. My waiting upon the Lord can become too much like an adult-style waiting and not enough

like a child's waiting. Consider that for which we wait: the return of our Savior, Lord and King; the fullness of the Kingdom of God on Earth as it is in Heaven; the end to all pain, suffering, tears, injustice, death, and the like; the experience of perfect love, joy, and peace throughout the world. I am just scratching the surface of all that will become a reality when Christ returns.



This Advent Season I am going to seek to be a person waiting with the active patience of a child. Is there an invitation in this for you as well? "Come, Lord Jesus, Come. Meet us now. Meet us here. Come, Lord Jesus, Come."

I wonder if the "child-like faith" that Christ calls us to live applies to the way we are to experience the Advent Season of "waiting." Henri Nouwen, in his small devotional piece "Waiting with Patience" reminds us that waiting is not meant to be passive (or as I am arguing here – adult). "It is an active waiting in which we live the present moment to the full in order to find there the signs of the One we are waiting for." I love this invitation into the present moment. You see, when I ask my children to wait with patience they absolutely stay in the present moment. And in doing so, they do receive more of my attention. They receive reminders that I am present, I have not forgotten them, and I still care about their needs and wants. Sometimes their persistence is rewarded with a hug or an opportunity to "patiently wait" on my lap. Sometimes I am the one that is ultimately rewarded.

I wonder if we can find similar surprises from our Heavenly Father when we are more active and persistent in our waiting. Perhaps a Scripture comes to our mind as a gentle reminder that He is listening. Or maybe we will experience the hand of the Father tapping us on our head or shoulder. We might even experience the Father placing us on His lap as He promises to hold us in the wait. Might we experience a bit of what we are waiting for in the future, right here in the present because we continue to pursue, persist, pray, seek, ask, beg, and remind the Father in many ways that we are still here waiting with anticipation?

Property Committee Report

The FPC Property Committee met in June, 2018 to recap the property's masonry project and future work on the facility. The vendor, Quality Masonry of Marion, OH completed the tuck pointing and applying weatherproofing sealant to the entire exterior of the building, including the stone in the courtyard, prior to Memorial Day weekend, 2018. The job also had the main entrance stonework at each side of the stairway, taken down and re-mortared. In addition, the site manager took care of items that were not originally quoted in the bid price, such as repairing the concrete corner of east entry facing south (Andrews Chapel) that wrought iron railing had split the corner concrete; prior roof patches (total of 4) that were no longer adhering to the rubberized roof, had adhesive pitch applied and were refastened; finally, original red brick, previously obscured by pine shrubbery, was exposed once shrubs were removed. Quality Masonry applied mortar slurry to adhere and protect red brick, which was then also treated with water repellent. The extra cost on the project by the vendor was cost on additional lineal feet of mortar used in the project. The vendor tuck pointed approximately 70% of the surface area of FPC; although a sizable expenditure, one well worth undertaken for the future structural integrity and historic architectural significance FPC has within our community.

The committee approved BCU Electric install a surge suppression component onto the buildings main power source, thereby rendering the need for various surge suppression devices throughout the facility. BCU also completed installation of a replacement ballast on the interior lamp located in the church loft.

In addition, the committee arrived at consensus that bids to have landscaping done where the prior shrubbery had been located, be undertaken. The committee discussed landscaping product features, such as an annual expense, versus a one time expenditure for services to have a lasting and visually appealing and practical solution. Two vendors

have been contacted and once bids have been secured, work to have these areas fiber lined and decorative small stone installed will be installed in Spring, 2019. This project has been provided in the church's 2019 budget.

In addition, due to financial considerations, another item deferred until Spring, 2019 is a refurbishing of all FPC wood exterior doors. The vendor, who has previously provided services on these surfaces, will remove all exterior hardware, remove weathered product from each door, refinish and apply weatherproofing product onto each door then reinstall all FPC wood exterior doors. This project has been provided in the church's 2019 budget.

I took it upon myself in August, before returning to my interim administrative role, to paint 97% of the third floor office space currently being used by Dolly Dong for Chinese Church office space. I intend to trim out the remainder of the room before Christmas.

Speaking of the church's upper floors, it has been suggested that an opinion on the tile floors' durability and longevity on the second and third floor be sought. A no cost, non-binding opinion is being sought from a local floor guy.

The only other area with which to update the congregation is the prospect to repair some loose slate shingles that have come ajar on the building. Our local roofing vendor has been contacted and there is nothing that currently requires immediate repair; however, in Spring, 2019, our vendor will be asked to assess and address roof issues. This project has been provided in the church's 2019 budget.

OUT OF CHAOS, HOPE

Response to the California Wildfires

Dear family of God,

We know that your hearts, like ours, have been broken as the devastation wrought by wildfires in California continues to increase in severity. In addition to the destruction of land and forests, the cost to lives and human community has been unprecedented, and those costs are still rising. The town of Paradise has been leveled: more than 80 people have been confirmed dead at this writing, and thousands more are unaccounted for. In Northern California, families are living in tents and having difficulty accessing basic services; many of those who have lost their homes are older than 60. While the focus is on those closest to the fires, the impact is widespread. Due to the smoke, communities hundreds of miles from the fires are being impacted by unhealthy air quality. What's more, after the wildfires there is an increased risk of mudslides.

Through Presbyterian Disaster Assistance (PDA), the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) has been present since the beginning of the disaster. Working closely with leadership in the affected presbyteries, we have released emergency grants to support the presbyteries in meeting the urgent needs of their neighbors. At the request of the Red Cross, PDA has deployed four disaster spiritual care providers from our national response team to work directly with survivors in shelters and the affected communities. We are deploying additional PDA teams to support the presbyteries in their assessment and response as they help their neighbors begin recovery. Additional grants for ongoing emergency support for survivors and long-term recovery will be forthcoming.

How You Can Help

Your gifts to DR000165 (U.S. Wildfires) will ensure that PDA has adequate resources to support the recovery. Gift of the Heart kits (see instructions at http://pda.pcusa.org/page/kits/) are a hands-on way to help others and a fun project for the Advent season; hygiene kits and school kits will especially be needed in California.

As people of faith we seek comfort, support, and direction from God. We ask that you join your spirits with ours as we walk with our California neighbors through the valley of the shadow.
