What is Worship?

This question was raised at our most recent session meeting. The question is simple enough, and yet I am convinced that when asked it is likely you will get as many different answers as there are people in a particular room. What about you – how would you answer this question? Is it what we do when we gather on Sunday mornings? Or does it speak to only specific things we do within our "church service"? What about the rest of the week? Are we worshiping when we pray and read our Bibles? Are we worshiping when we mow the grass, work in the garden, or watch a movie? What makes something that we do worshipful? When does music

become "worship music"? Is there a particular type or style that only fits this category? The questions surrounding worship are some of the most hotly debated among Christians and congregations, perhaps being one of the most frequent causes of congregational disputes, decisions to "leave the church," and even church splits.

I hope by now you have picked up on the difficulty surrounding this simple question. "Worship" is sacred and meaningful to each of us. Yet though we gather as individuals on Sunday morning, we are gathering as a community seeking to come together in unity of heart and mind. And while worship speaks to so much more



than our gatherings on Sunday morning, it is often within this context that this tension is most apparent. These conversations remain relevant at First Presbyterian Church. In my eight years of serving as your pastor, many things have changed regarding our Sunday morning service, and many things have remained a regular and steady part of our gatherings. There are still many questions asked of me and others about our worship style and space. There are questions (and preferences no doubt) about the organ, praise band, and choir. The questions and concerns are important to you, to me, and to your Session as well.

All too often these conversations are framed around one's preference, experience, or opinion as to what one thinks might help our church grow. While these concerns are important, left without an intentional effort to build this conversation upon the biblical foundation provided by the Lord we can too easily make decisions based on our own desires, the popular choice, or simply what we think might keep the most people happy. We need the biblical foundation, and fortunately the Scriptures are not silent on this matter. There are clear teachings laid out in the Bible regarding worship that can provide a common foundation for all Christ-followers. This foundation can and should become a place upon which we can build and frame our conversation as we seek to become a community of faith that more fully worships God. It is a desire to be faithful to this biblical foundation of worship that has led the elders to ask me to lead a series of teachings on

I will primarily be doing this from the pulpit this summer; please remember that if you miss church you can listen to the sermons on our website. If you have particular questions or interests related to this topic I invite you to pass them along to me and perhaps I will be able to address them throughout this series. Let us all join in prayer as we seek to more fully align ourselves with the Lord's desire for us regarding our worship, and may God alone be glorified.
